- 4 Vibrating their bodies, they send signals through the forest plants they live on.
- 5 And every sound has its own particular meaning.
- This treehopper mother communicates with her young, encouraging them to stay together, so that she can protect them, for there are plenty here waiting to eat young treehoppers.
- 7 An assassin bug. Armed with piercing mouthparts and sticky front legs.
- 8 Capable of literally sucking the life out of her entire brood.
- 9 But she can't guard them all.
- 10 She needs help from friends in high places.
- 11 Bees.
- 12 They are very aggressive.
- 13 This is more than the assassin bug bargained for.
- 14 Mission accomplished. Her brood are safe.
- 15 The bees don't protect the treehoppers for free.
- 16 A little tickle on a treehopper's back, and they exude a sugary liquid, honeydew, a sweet reward for protecting them.
- 17 It's just one of the countless ways in which forest species work together.

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




- These long-tailed macagues live in Bali.

- 15 The art of the deal.
- 16 A banana? How dare you?
- 17 A bar of chocolate? That's better.
- 18 The real skill is in the negotiations.
- 19 The macaques are playing us at our own game.
- 20 They demand whatever they want.
